ADOPTION OF MINUTES

1. Minutes of the Sustainability and Environmental Advisory Committee Meeting held on Tuesday, April 23, 2024

The Minutes of the Sustainability and Environmental Advisory Committee Meeting held on Tuesday, April 23, 2024 were approved.

NEW BUSINESS

2. Environmental Achievement Awards 2024

The Solid Waste Programs Specialist provided a presentation entitled "2024 Environmental Achievement Awards" that covered the following topics:

• An overview of the Environmental Achievement Award event that was held on June 1, 2024 at Blue Mountain Park including photos from the event, information displays and the winners of each category

The Solid Waste Program Specialist thanked the SEAC sub-committee for their contribution to the awards and event.

• Discussion ensued relative to the desire to recognize the environmental achievements of indigenous peoples, an honorarium to be given to award recipients and promotional advertisements for the event via social media

The Committee thanked staff for hosting the event and for providing guidance throughout the award process.

3. Environmental Education in Schools Program

The Solid Waste Programs Specialist provided a presentation entitled "Environmental Education in Coquitlam Schools" that covered the following topics:

 An overview of the environmental education provided in schools including existing workshops, contracted programs, topics and future plans

Discussion ensued relative to the following:

- The desire to enhance environmental education in middle schools through the creation of art displays
- The desire to integrate education related to green careers and green transportation
- The desire to have City staff visit schools to share information about civic environmental services, such as solid waste programs

4. Environmental Bylaw Updates: Stream and Drainage System Protection Bylaw

The Environmental Education and Enforcement Manager provided a presentation entitled "Stream and Drainage System Protection Bylaw Amendment" that covered the following topics:

- An overview of recently approved bylaw amendments including the Real-Time Monitoring (RTM) program expansion, contingency planning for storms, groundwater management requirements and changes to the Joint Professional Practice Guidelines
- An overview of the citywide RTM implementation including formalizing the prequalified providers process and requiring independent RTM service providers

Discussion ensued relative to the following:

- The desire to know of any concerns from developers relating to the size of water treatment systems
- The desire for further clarity regarding water recirculation statistics and emergency contingency plans

The Committee voiced appreciation to staff for these updates, recognizing the benefit these changes will have on the City. The Committee also thanked Council for approving these bylaw updates.


5. Committee Members' Roundtable / Emerging Issues

METRO VANCOUVER ROLE IN REGIONAL AIR QUALITY


- Delegated authority under BC Environmental Management Act
- MVRD Non-Road Diesel Engine Emission Regulation since 2012
- Clean Air Plan: to further reduce nonroad emissions
- Metro Vancouver Board direction to engage on reducing emissions from small gas-powered equipment

Estimated 400-600K equipment units in Metro Vancouver




TRANSITION TO EMISSION-FREE TECHNOLOGY

EXPLORING REGIONAL PUBLIC POLICY OPTIONS

Options include:

- Phasing out types of equipment over time based on preparedness for transition
- Transition strategies for larger professional fleets
- Exemptions for equipment with no electric alternatives
